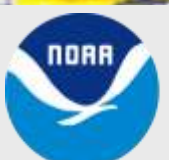
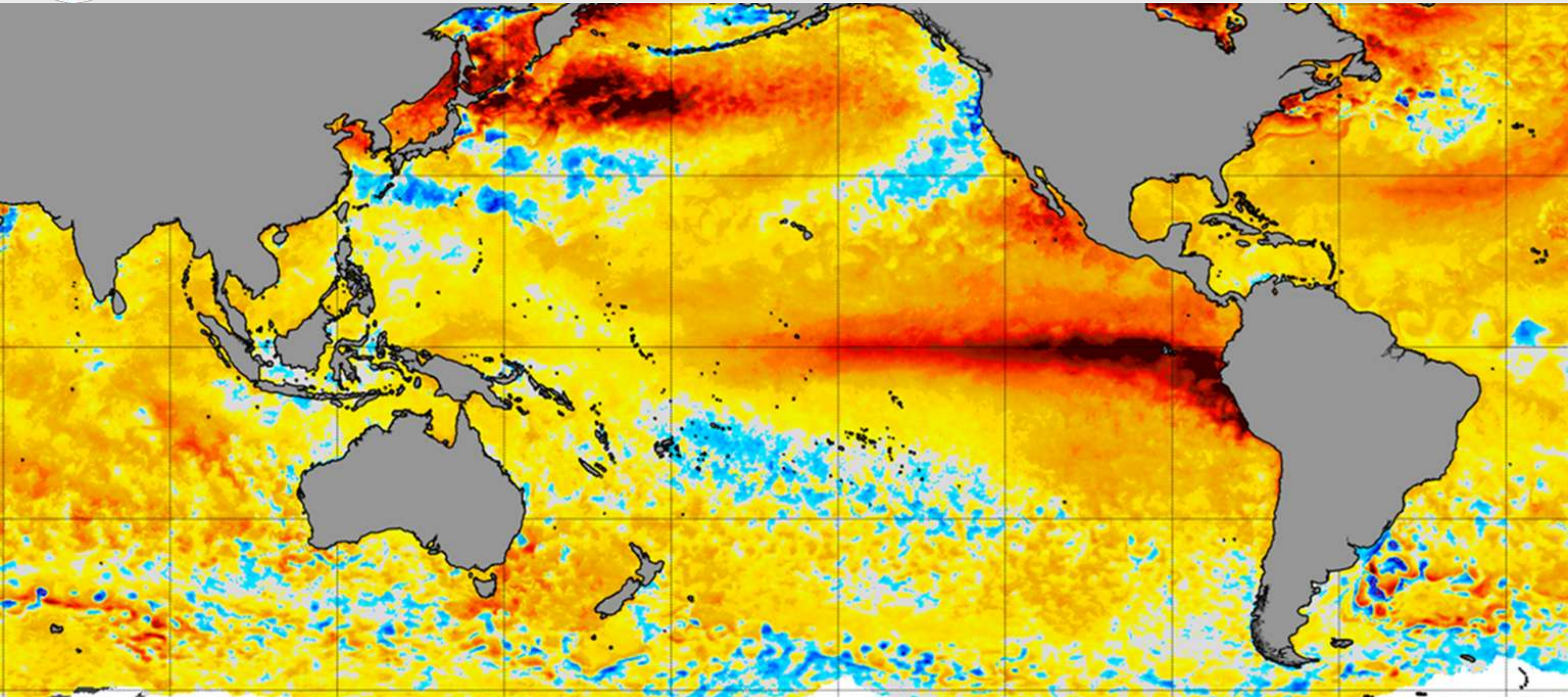

What is El Niño?

El Niño is the warm phase of the coupled climate pattern between the ocean and atmosphere called **El Niño-Southern Oscillation (ENSO)** in the tropical Pacific Ocean.

How is it quantified?

Sea-Surface Temperature Anomalies in this region

Niño 3.4 Region

El Niño technically occurs when this SST anomaly exceeds a 3-month average of $+0.5^{\circ}\text{C}$ for 5 consecutive monthly periods.

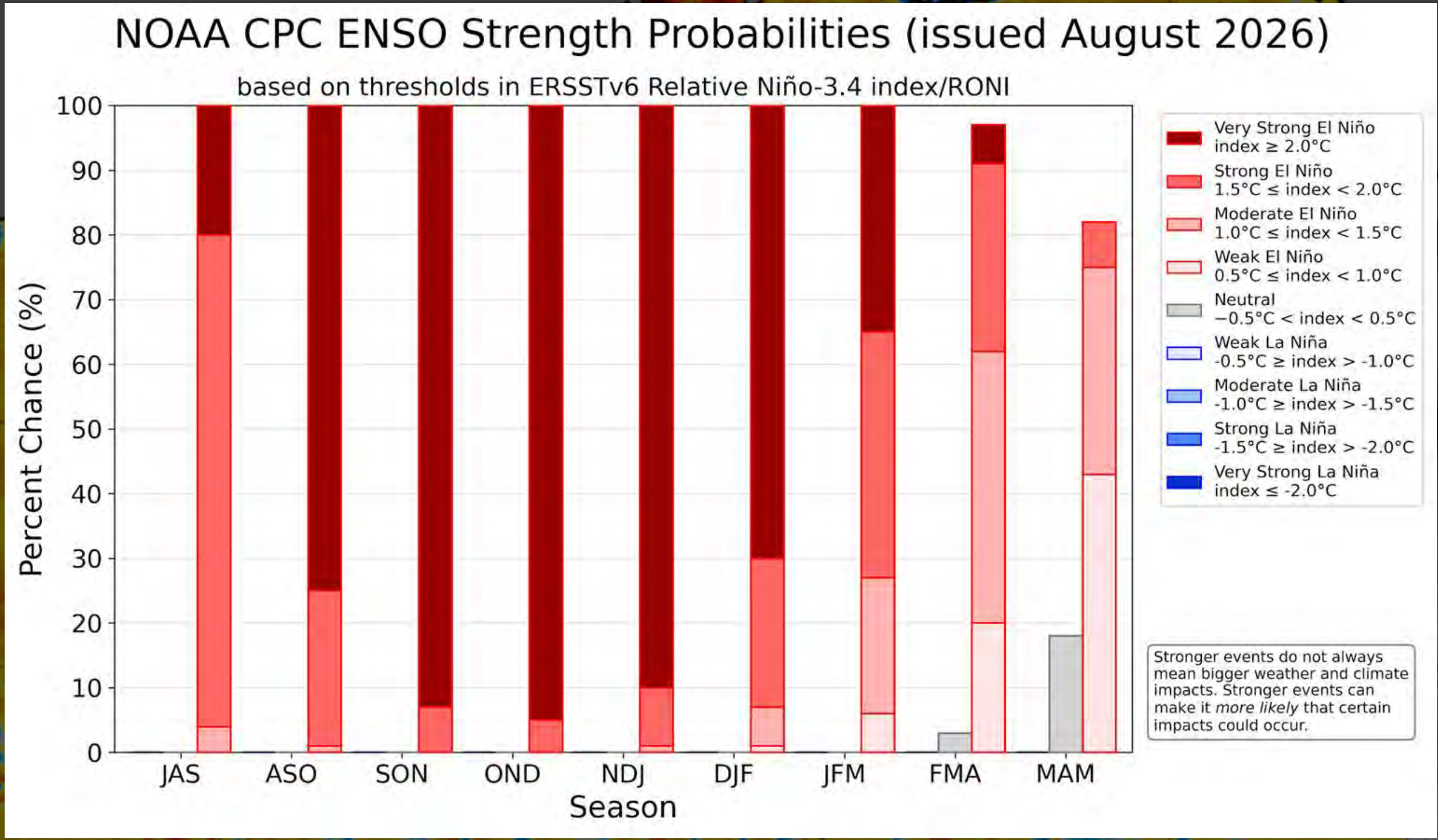

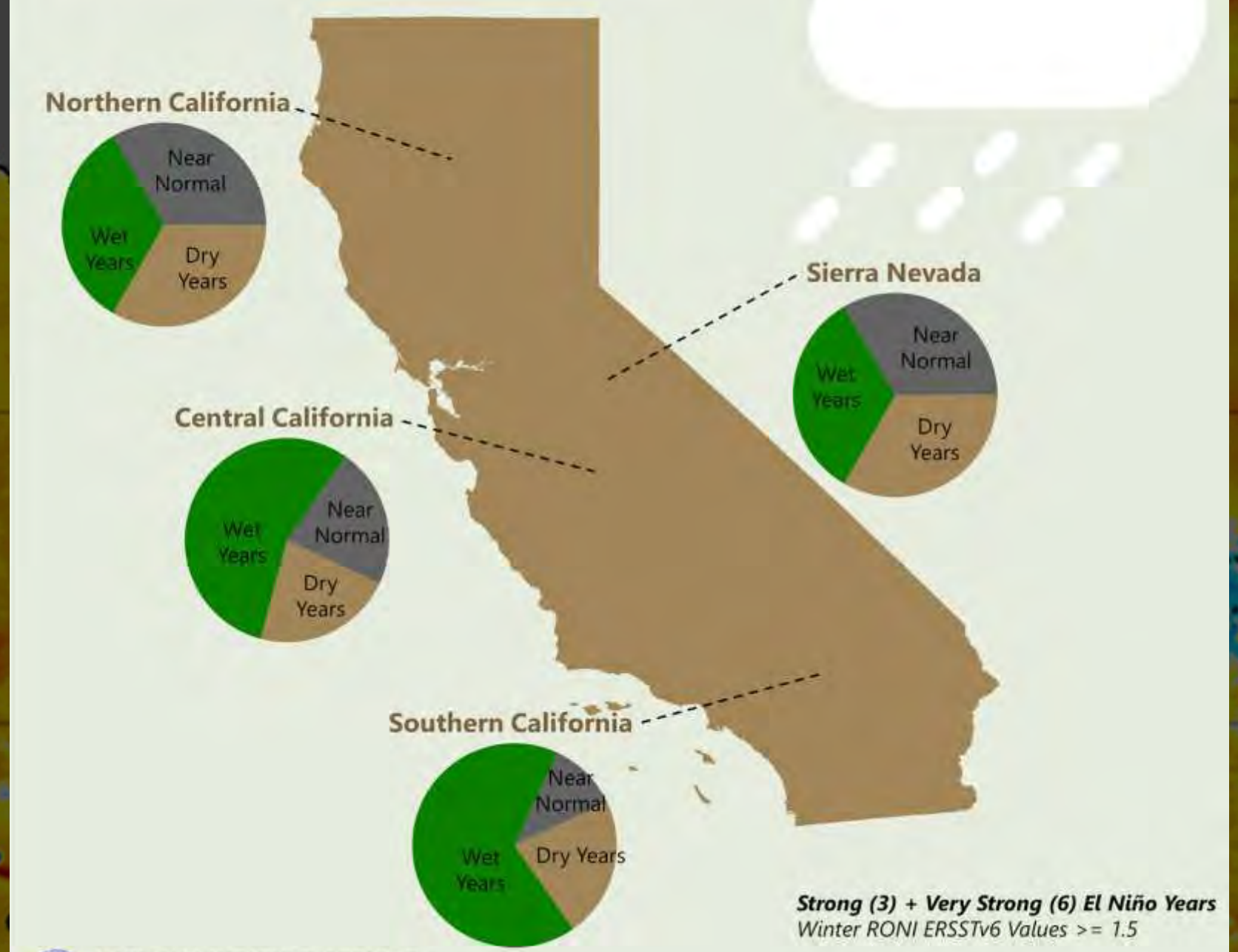

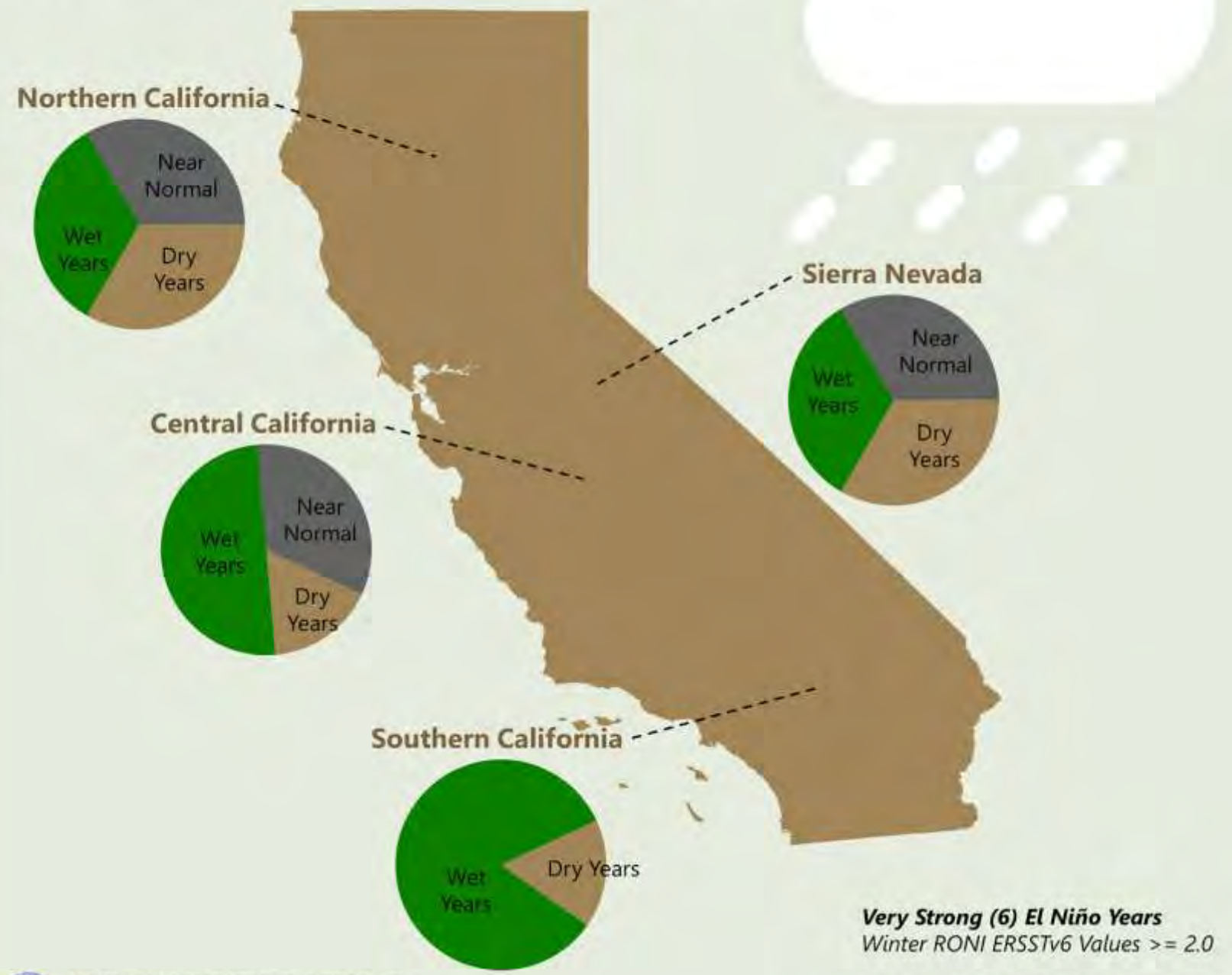

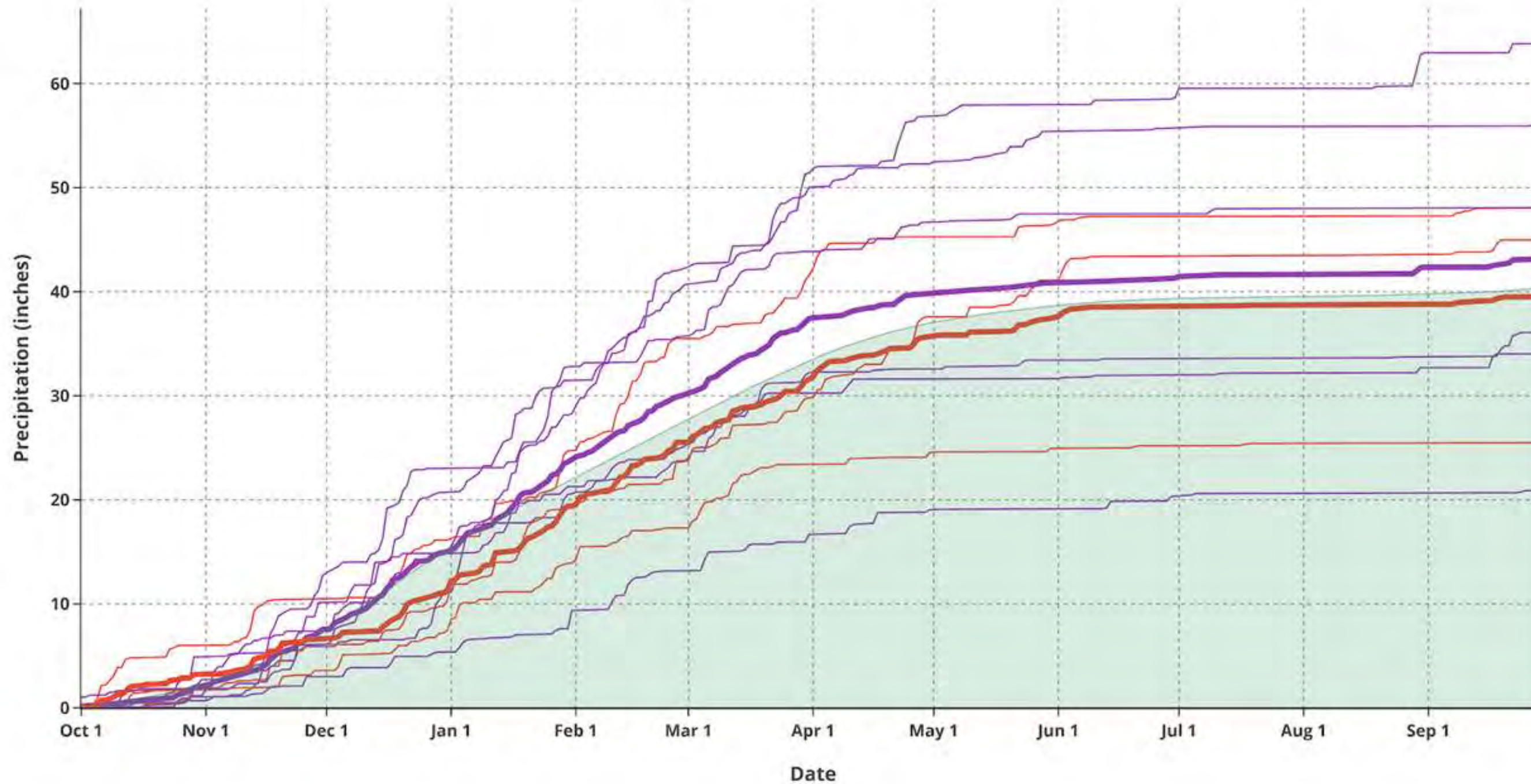

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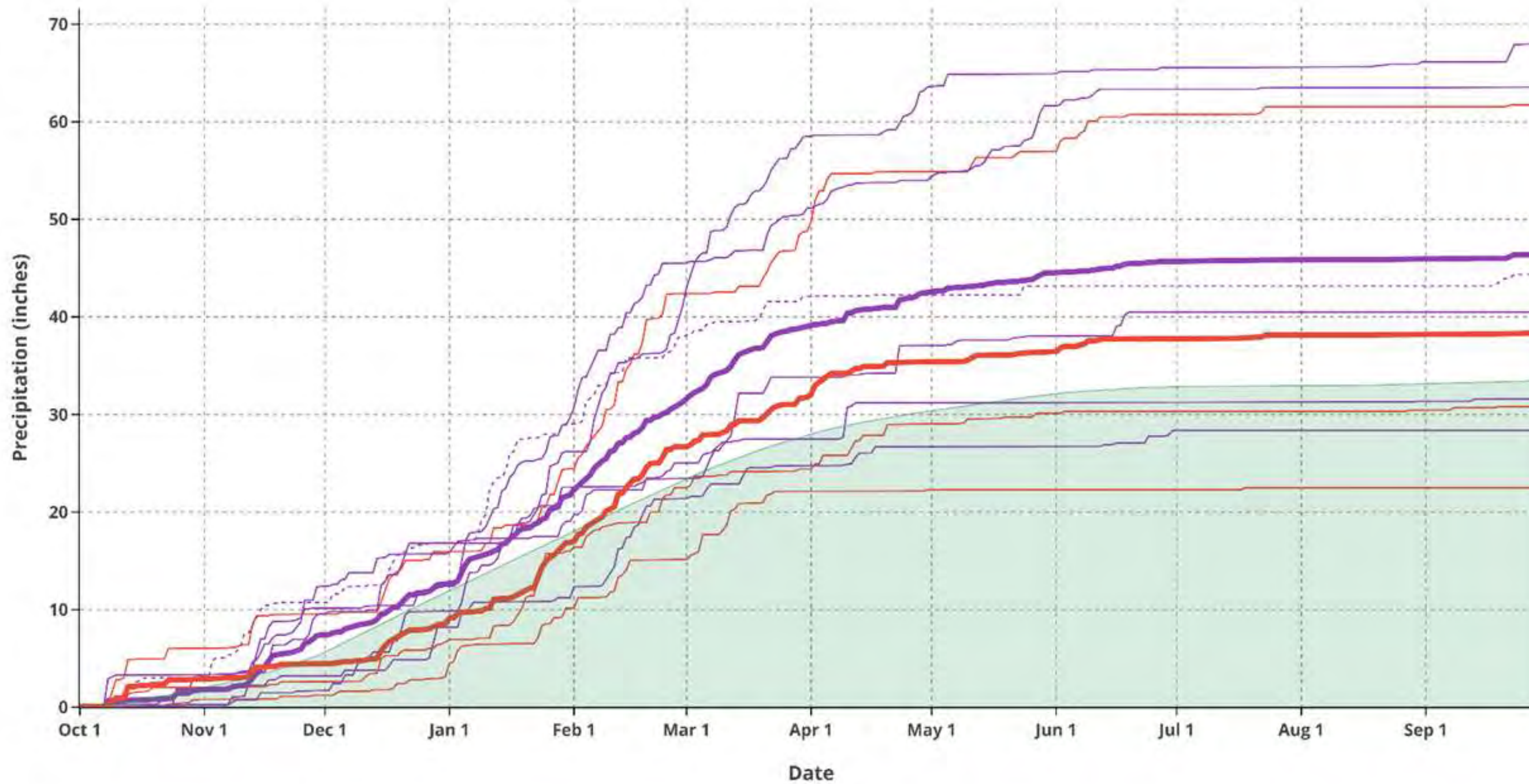

Redding Area (rddthr) — Cumulative Precipitation



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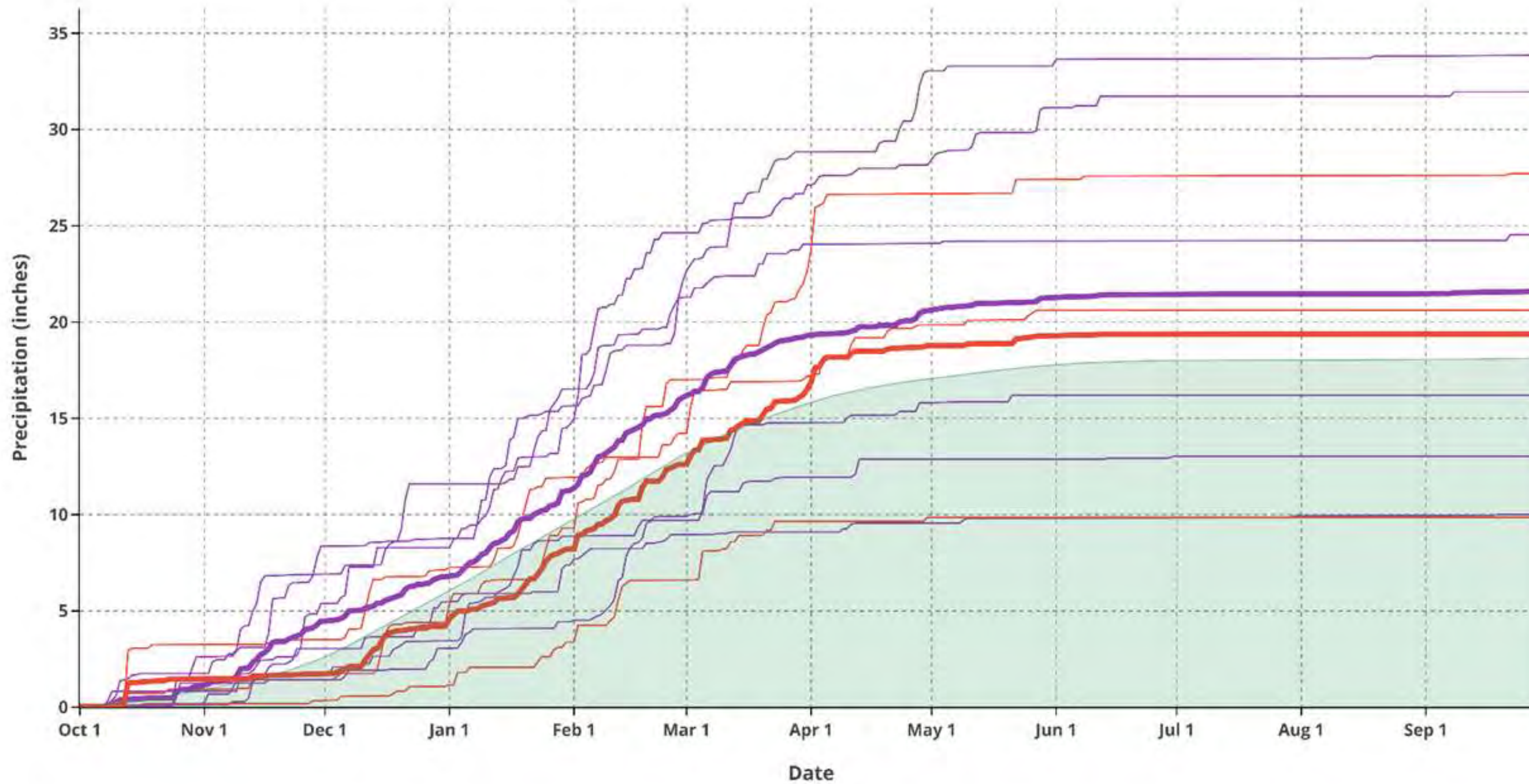

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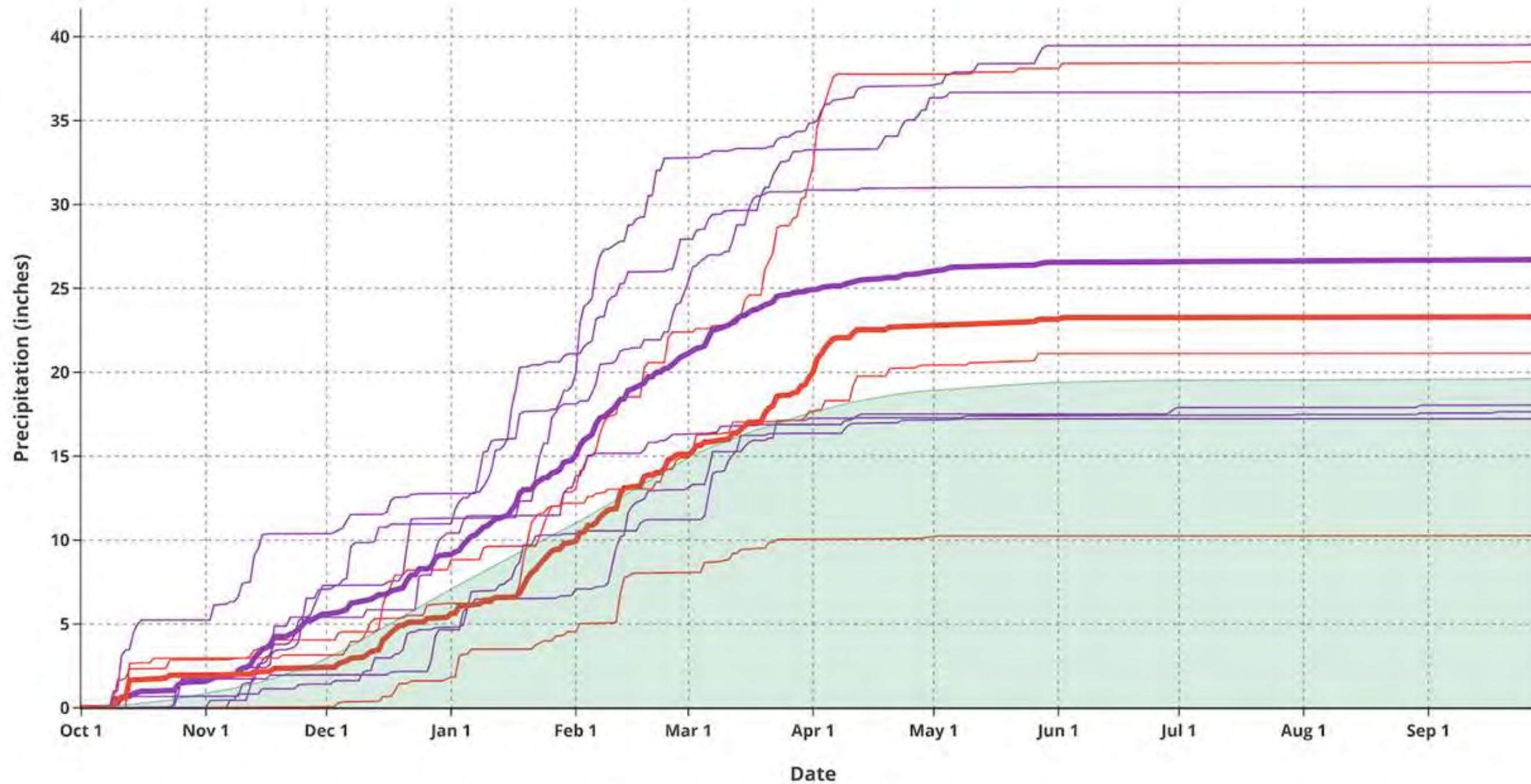

SAN FRANCISCO INTERNATIONAL AP (sfo) — Cumulative Precipitation



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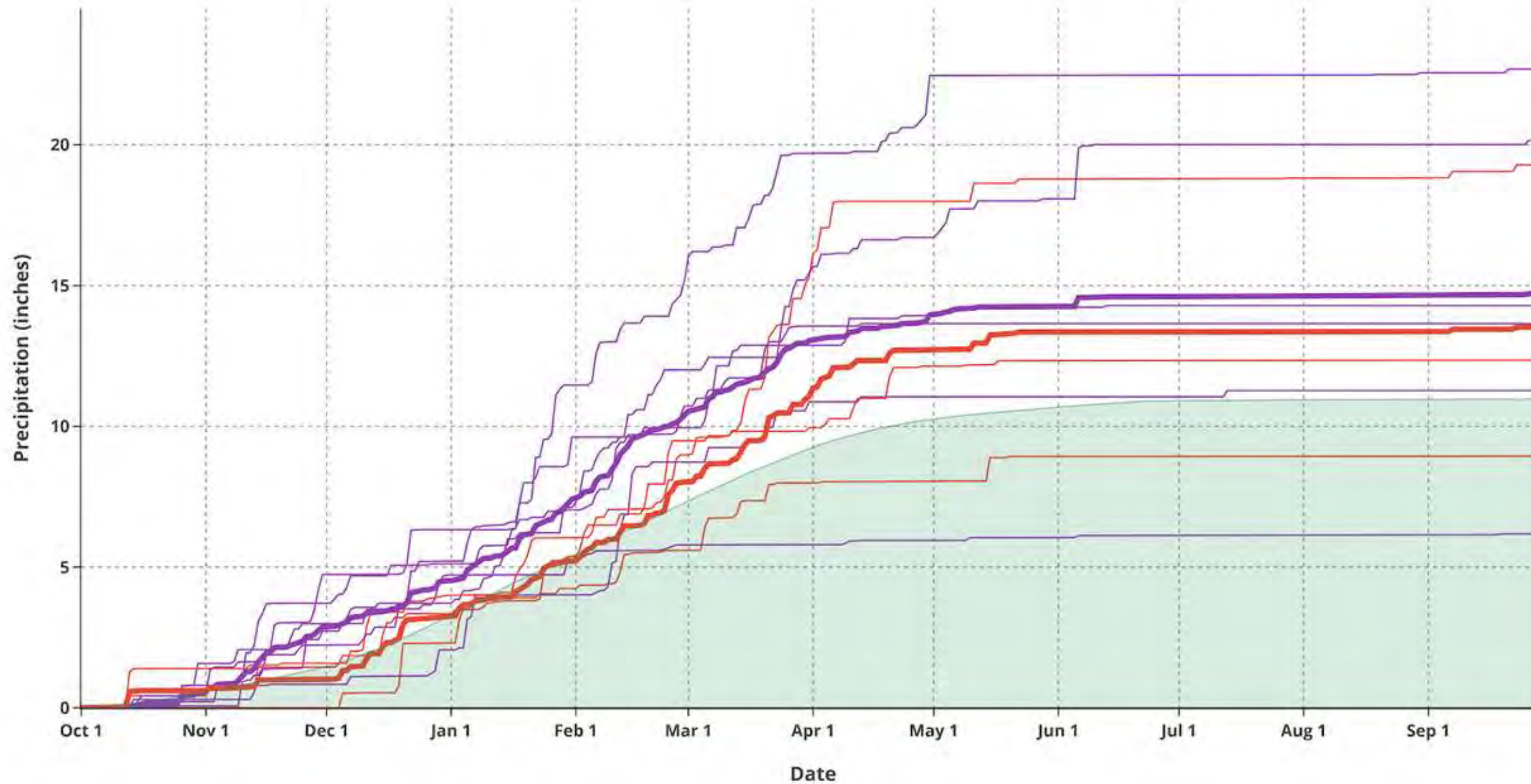

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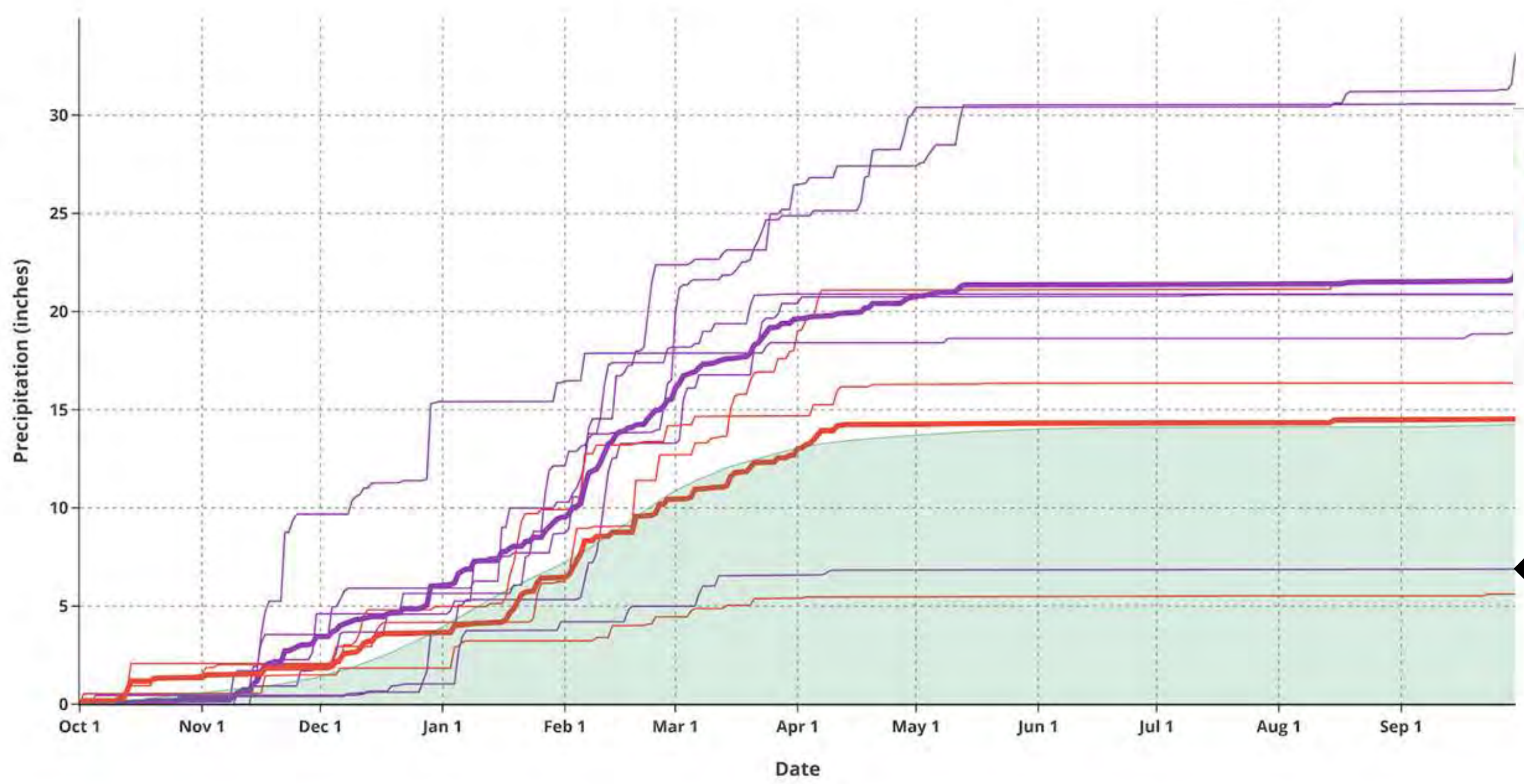

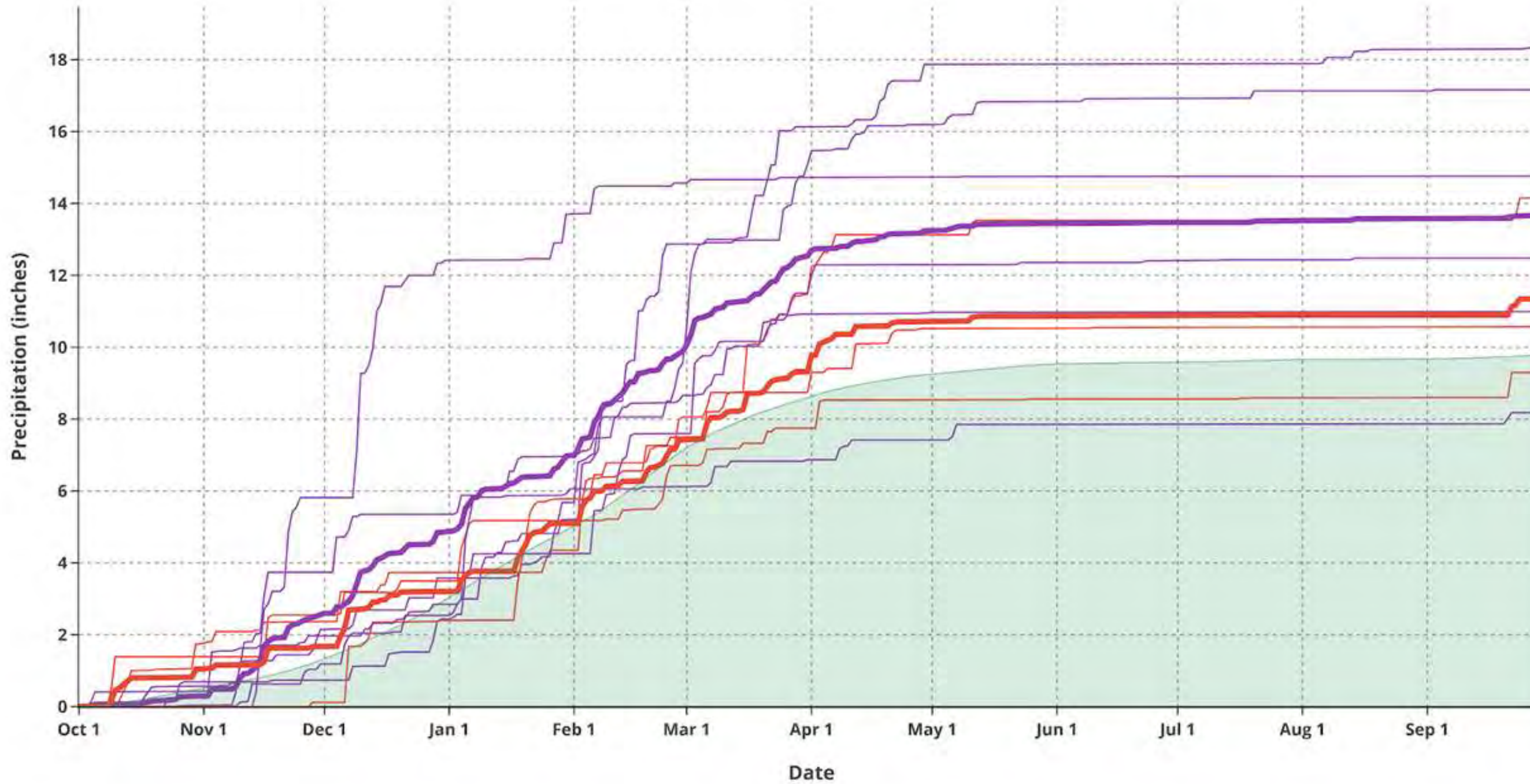

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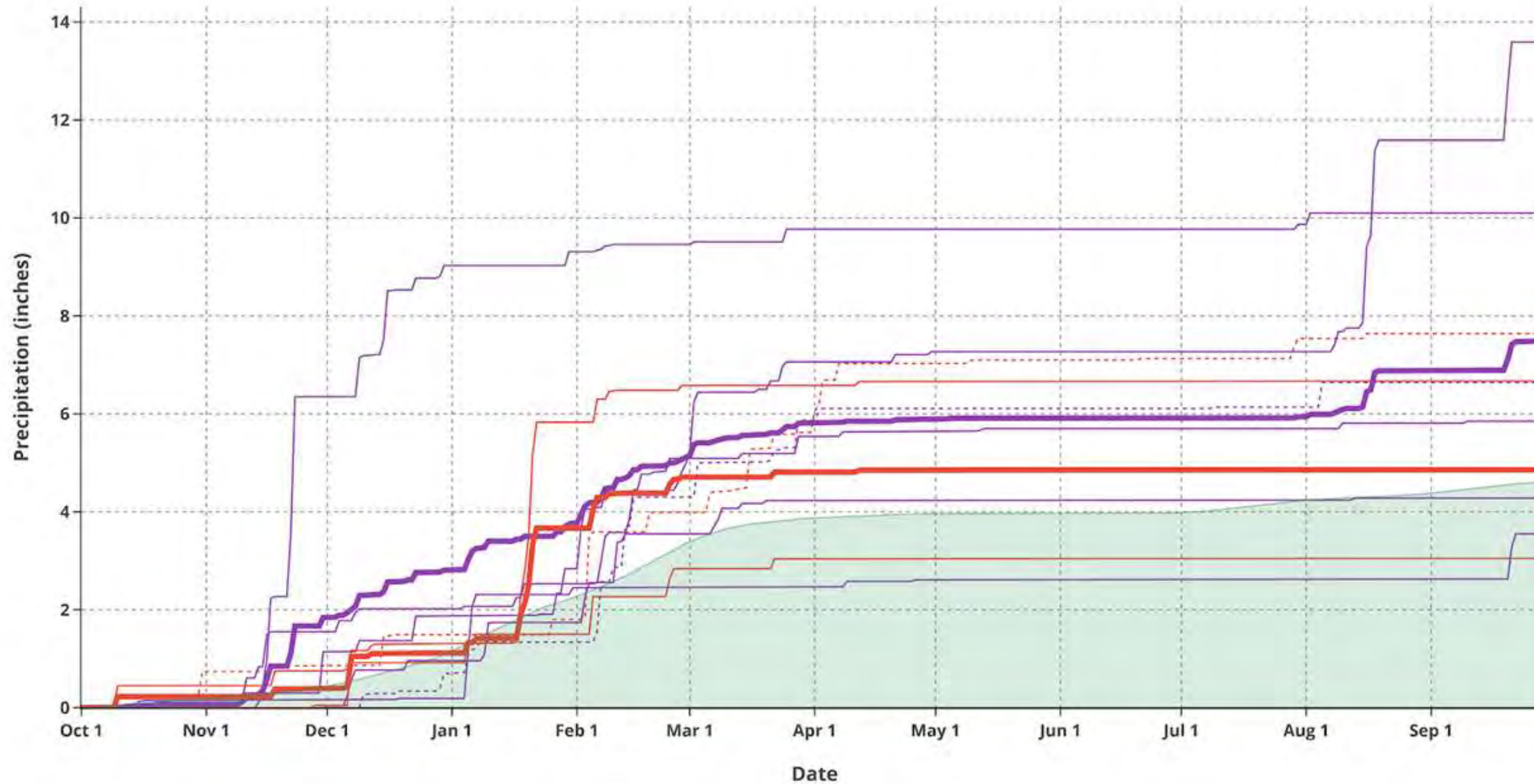

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Sooooo ... What Do We Know?

August 21, 2026

- ✓ El Niño is already here.
- ✓ El Niño will be **strong** or **very strong**.
- ✓ El Niño historically results in an active Eastern Pacific tropical activity.
e.g., CA Impact: 2023 Hurricane Hilary
- ✓ **Southern California:**
Strong or **Very Strong** El Niños tend to favor *wetter than normal conditions*.
- ✓ **Northern California:**
Precipitation predictability is less certain.
- ✓ Individual storms define a season for a community.
- ✓ We are closing out the Water Year with nearly all the major reservoirs in good shape.

Good morning, partners! Here are your morning forecast updates:

- A weather system will bring periods of light to moderate rain / mountain snow showers later today into Sunday afternoon, with best chances over the foothills and mountains. Most widespread shower activity is anticipated Saturday through early Sunday morning. Lingering Sierra showers are expected through Sunday afternoon.
- A Winter Weather Advisory remains in effect for the northern Sierra and southern Cascades above 6000 ft from Friday evening to Sunday morning. Total snow accumulations of 3 to 8 inches are expected, locally up to 12 inches over highest peaks.
- Thunderstorm chances have diminished for today. There is still a 10-15% chance of isolated thunderstorms on Saturday; highest chances south of Highway 50. Main threats will be lightning, brief heavy rain, small hail and gusty winds.
- Drier and warmer weather returns next week.

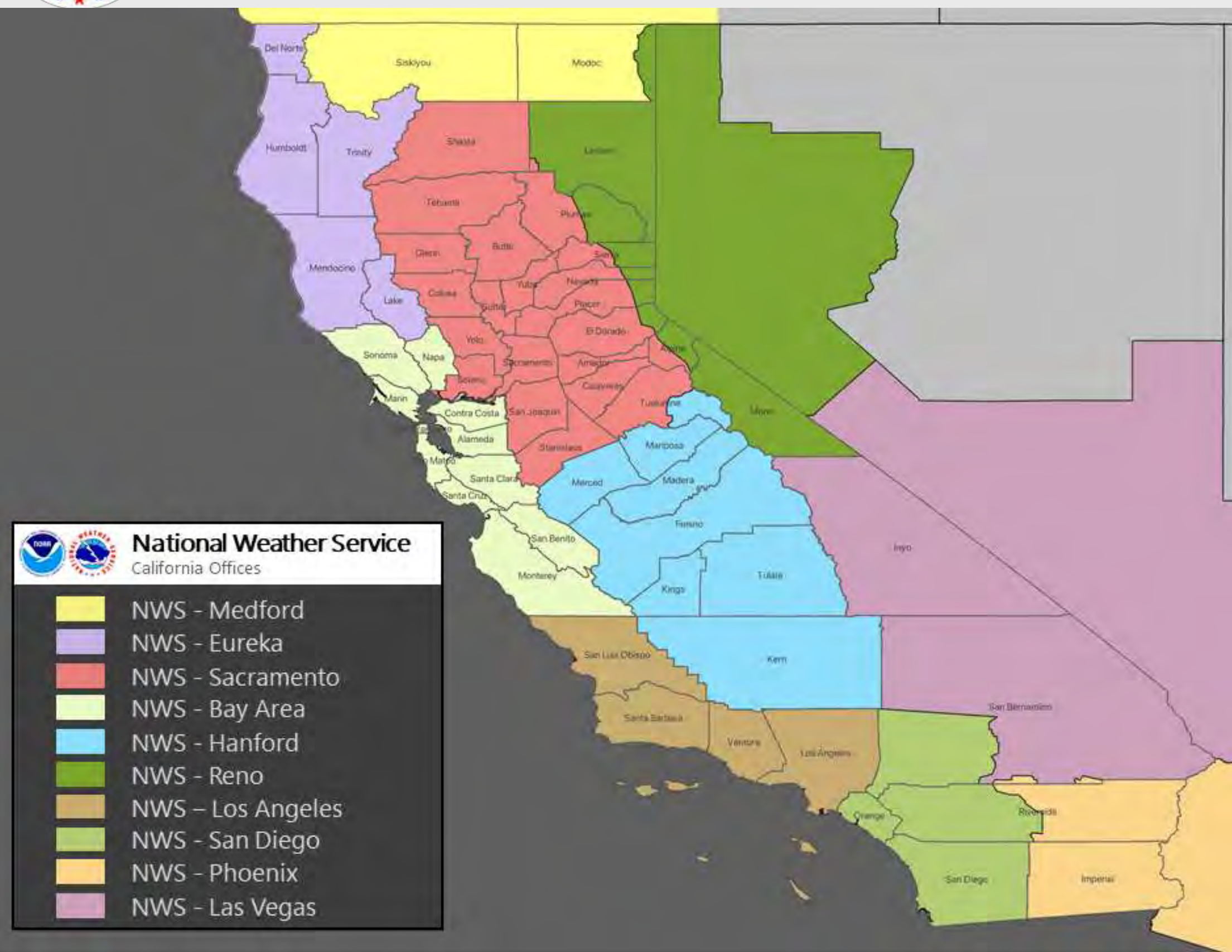

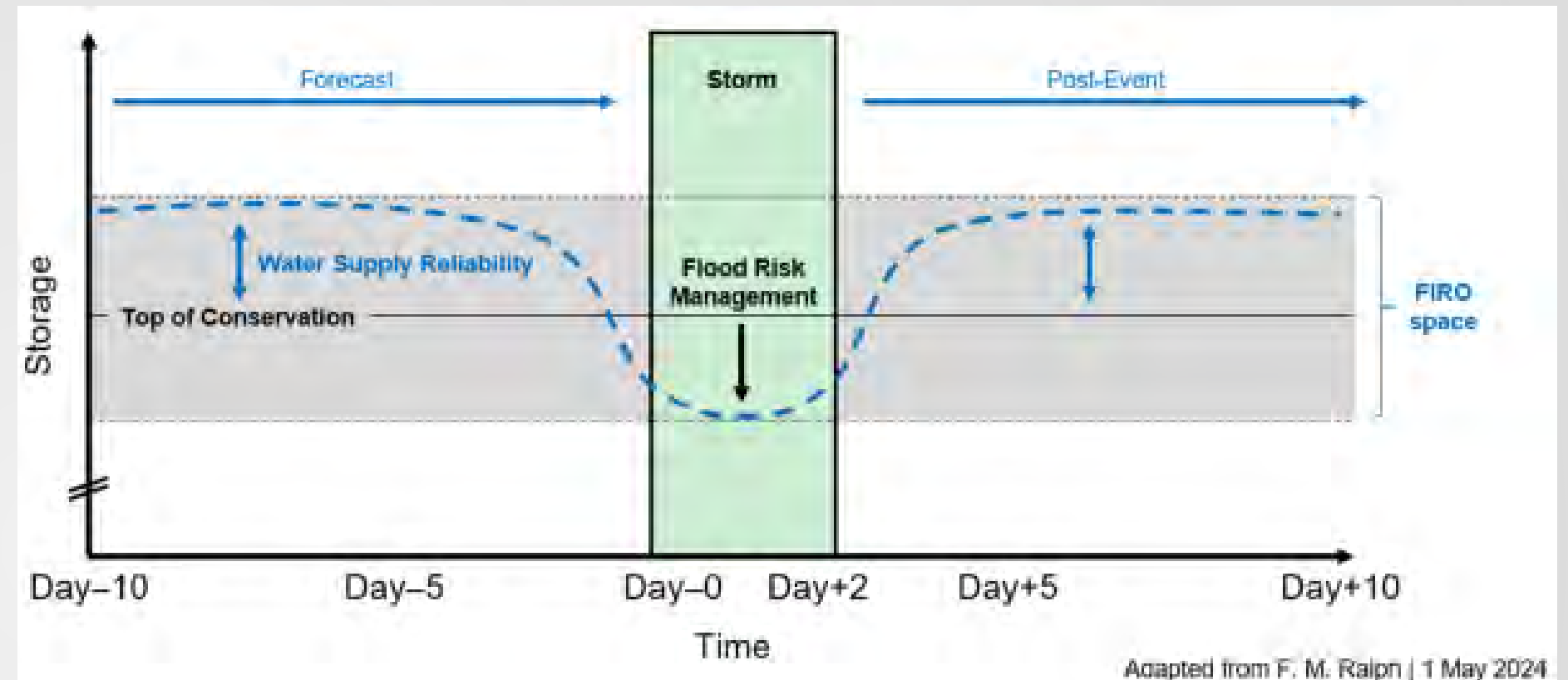


Image: Concept of Forecast Informed Reservoir Operations (Ralph, 2024)

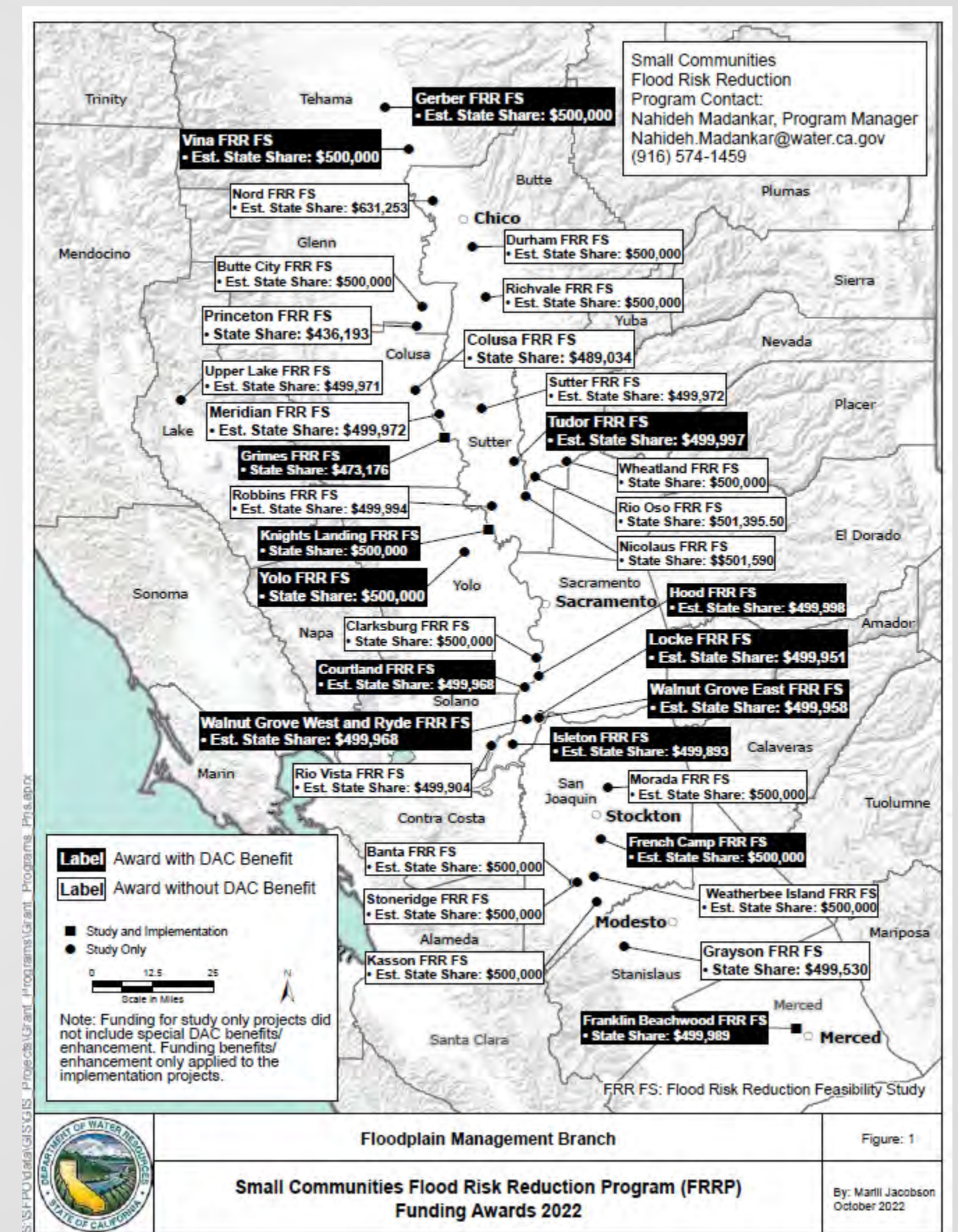
Dam Safety and Climate Resilience Program

- Voters approved \$450M in Prop 4 to start the new Dam Safety and Climate Resilience Program
- Prioritizes protection of public safety, restoration of water storage, flood risk reduction, enhancement of water supply reliability, protection of water quality, and enhancement, protection, or restoration of habitat for fish and wildlife
- DWR had to shift the development of the guidelines to a longer regulation process overseen by the State Office of Administrative Law (OAL)
- DWR-DSOD used this regulation process when preparing the requirements for dam owners SB92 mapping requirements
- **Project solicitations expected in 2027**



Small Communities Flood Risk Reduction Program

- Recommended by the 2012 Central Valley Flood Protection Plan, this program addresses the affordability issues many small communities with populations less than 10,000 people to achieve flood risk reductions without promoting risk inducing growth
- 35 communities are protected by State Plan of Flood Control levee systems
- All 35 communities have completed feasibility studies
- 3 communities: Grimes, Knight's Landing, and Franklin-Beachwood have funding for initial phases of flood risk reduction construction projects
- Due to the limited funding, communities are being encouraged to submit phased projects and seek Federal (FEMA, USDA, HUD, or USACE) grants in addition to the State funding
- **Draft Guidelines expected Q4 2026**

Federal Flood Risk Management Standard Rescission at HUD

- Federal Register Docket: FR-65-P01
- Restores HUD's regulations (mostly) to state prior to April 23, 2004
- Introduces some inconsistencies with types of building elevations and ASCE 24-24 / International Building Code standards
- Provides exceptions for limited improvements in floodways, such as functional dependent uses, utility lines, and *de minimis* improvements when using HUD funds
- Does permit the use of insurance as a mitigation approach for critical actions within a floodway when using HUD funds
- Grants exceptions from the 8-step decision making process for repairs, rehabilitation, or replacement of certain infrastructure, including streets, curbs, and gutters ... but this does not apply to levees, chemical storage, wastewater facilities, or sewer lagoons

Section 203 Workshop

- Federal funding for U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) feasibility studies is shrinking.
- The General Investigation (GI) program, historically the primary path for federally led studies, is declining, forcing Districts to make tough choices: descoping, terminating, or shifting studies to alternative pathways like Section 203.
- A Section 203 study allows a non-federal interest — a city, state, or regional agency — to lead a USACE-compliant feasibility study using local funds. Instead of waiting for limited federal appropriations, communities can maintain momentum and keep critical projects on track.

FLOOD DIVERSION FOR RECHARGE ENHANCEMENT

Technical Guidance Water Code 1242.1 - Flood Diversions for Groundwater Recharge UPDATED TO REFLECT EXECUTIVE ORDER N-16-25

This document provides technical guidance on a recently enacted pathway for parties to divert surface water to help alleviate flooding while also recharging California's depleted groundwater basins. Please note the responses to these questions have been highly simplified to summarize complex issues and should not be considered formal or legal guidance. This document may be updated periodically. General Questions

What is Water Code section [1242.1](#)?

On July 10, 2023, Senate Bill 122 added section 1242.1 to the California Water Code (Section 1242.1) with the dual purpose of managing floods and expediting the restoration of the State's groundwater levels. Section 1242.1 creates a pathway that can be used during extreme flood events that allows for diversion of flood water without a water right. These diversions can have dual benefits: reducing flood risks and impacts, while at the same time recharging groundwater aquifers. Section 1242.1 includes reporting requirements and other protective conditions that are intended to prevent impacts to sensitive infrastructure, ecosystems, and existing water rights holders.

Can surface water be diverted anywhere or at any time under Water Code section 1242.1?

No, Section 1242.1 establishes limitations on when and where floodflows can be diverted.

What are the general requirements of Water Code section 1242.1?

- Diversions can only occur if a local or regional agency has issued a public notice that flows downstream of the point of diversion are at imminent risk of flooding and inundation of lands, roads, or structures.
- Diversions must comply with Section 1242.1's specified protective conditions, including noticing and reporting requirements.
- Section 1242.1 expires on January 1, 2029.

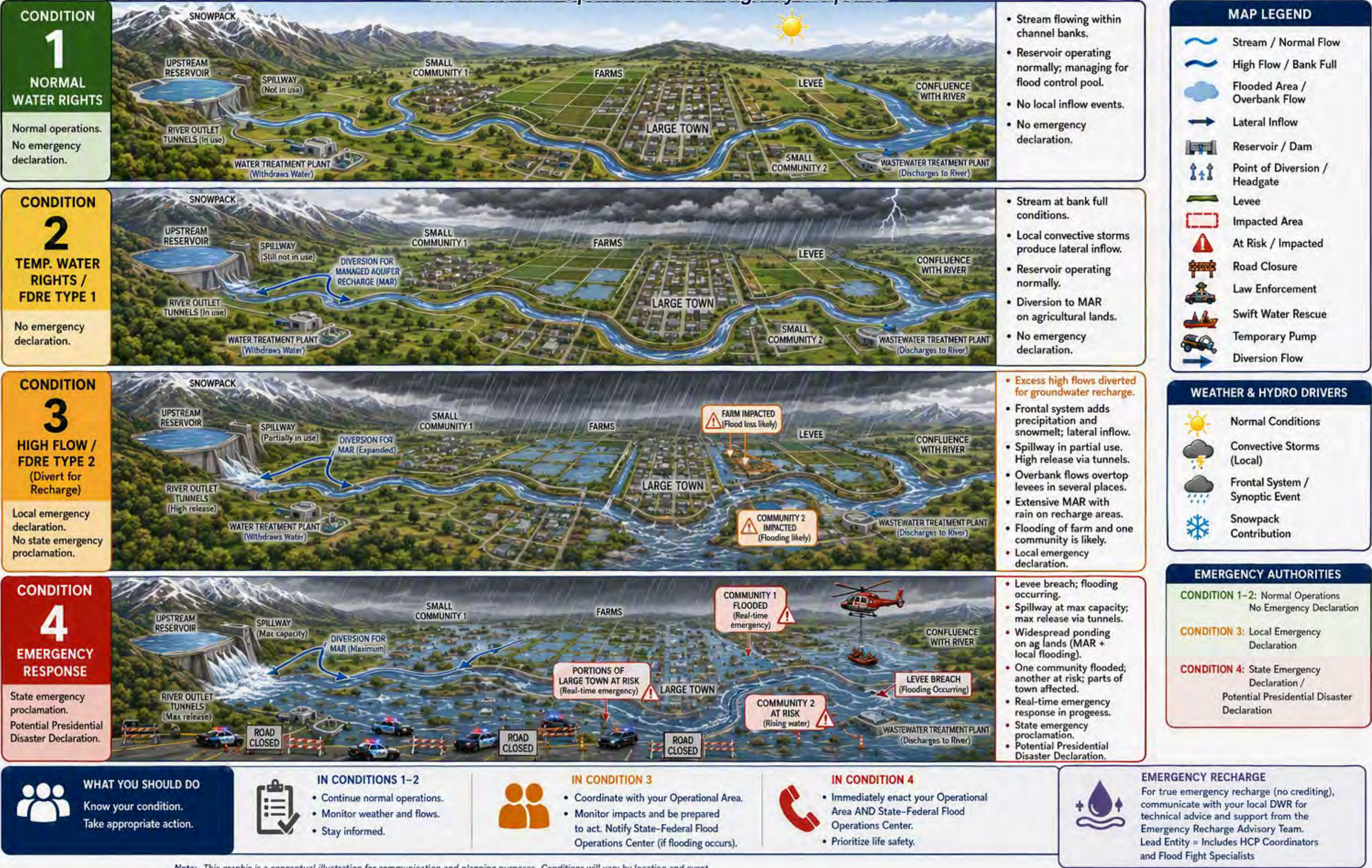
Executive Order

How did Executive Order N-16-25 modify Water Code Section 1242.1?

On January 31, 2025, Gov. Gavin Newsom issued [Executive Order N-16-25](#) to facilitate the use of flood waters to recharge California's aquifers by suspending certain requirements of Water Code 1242.1. The suspension only applies to 39 counties (the

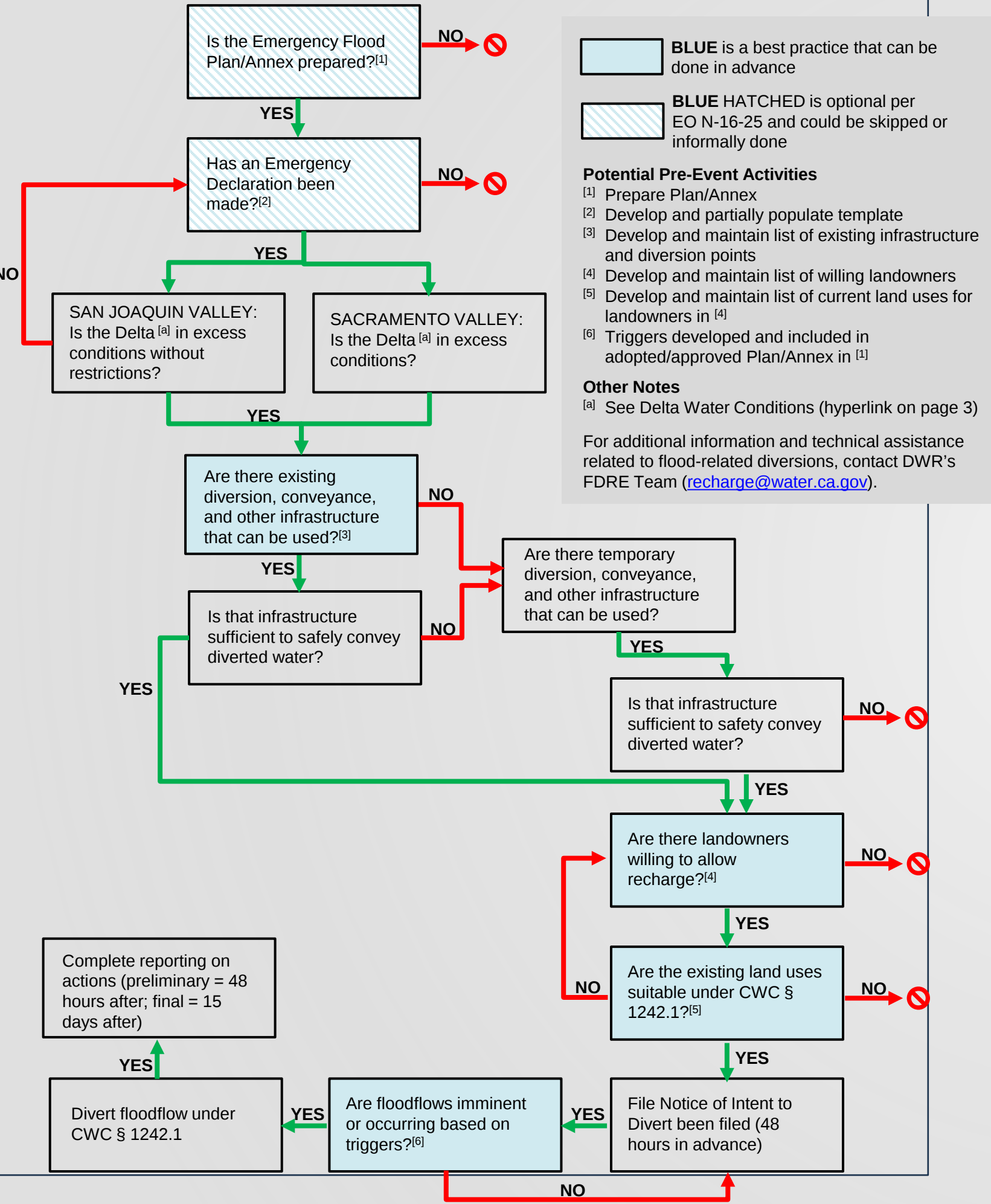


SB 122 / CWC 1242.1 Background

- CWC 1242.1 permits local entities to adopt plans to facilitate the dual objectives timely diversions of floodwater to promote groundwater recharge (which addresses future water supply issues) and to address anticipated downstream or localized flood losses

- Local agency must have considered flood risk as part of an adopted general plan or for urban areas within the Sacramento-San Joaquin Drainage District an adopted local plan of flood control (per CWC 8201)

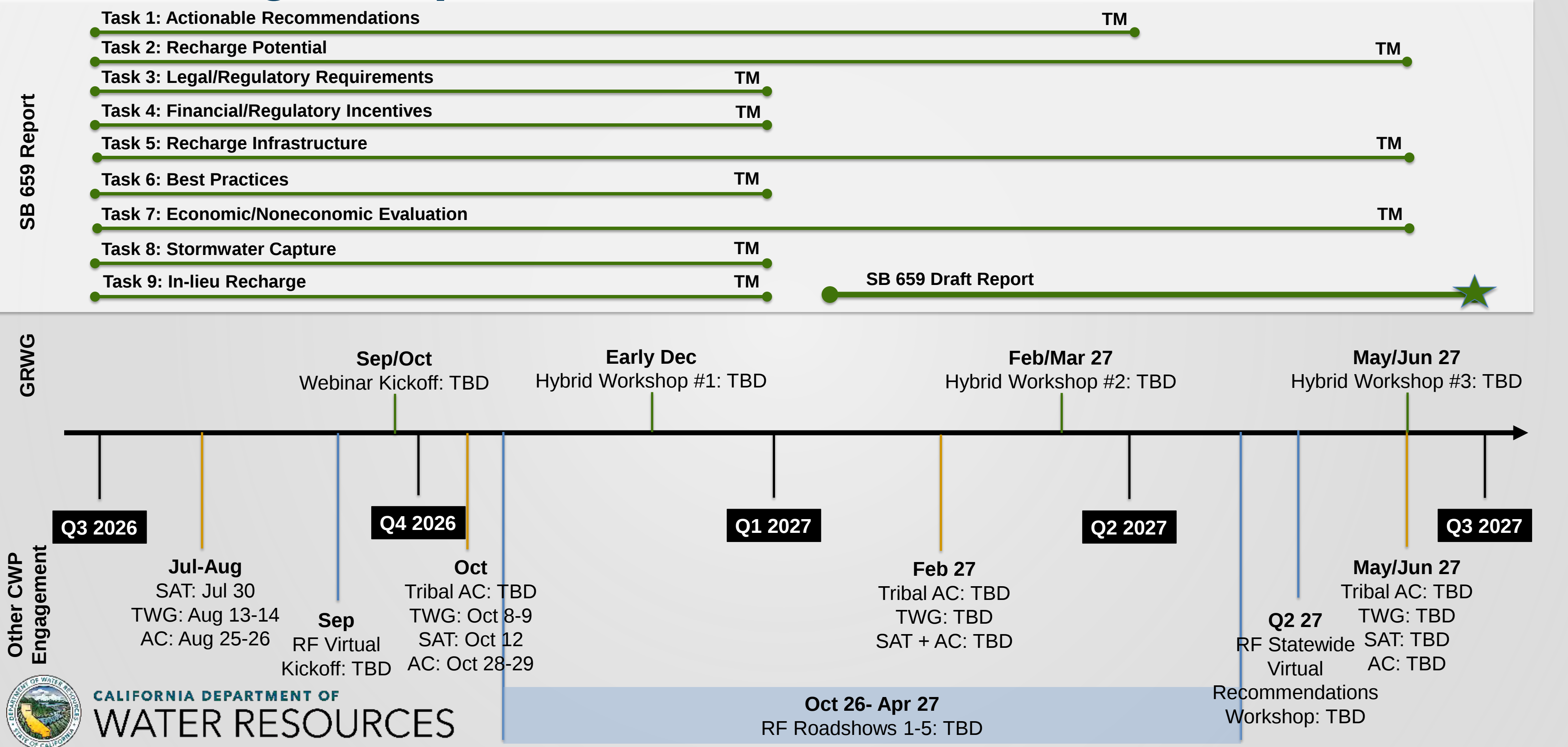

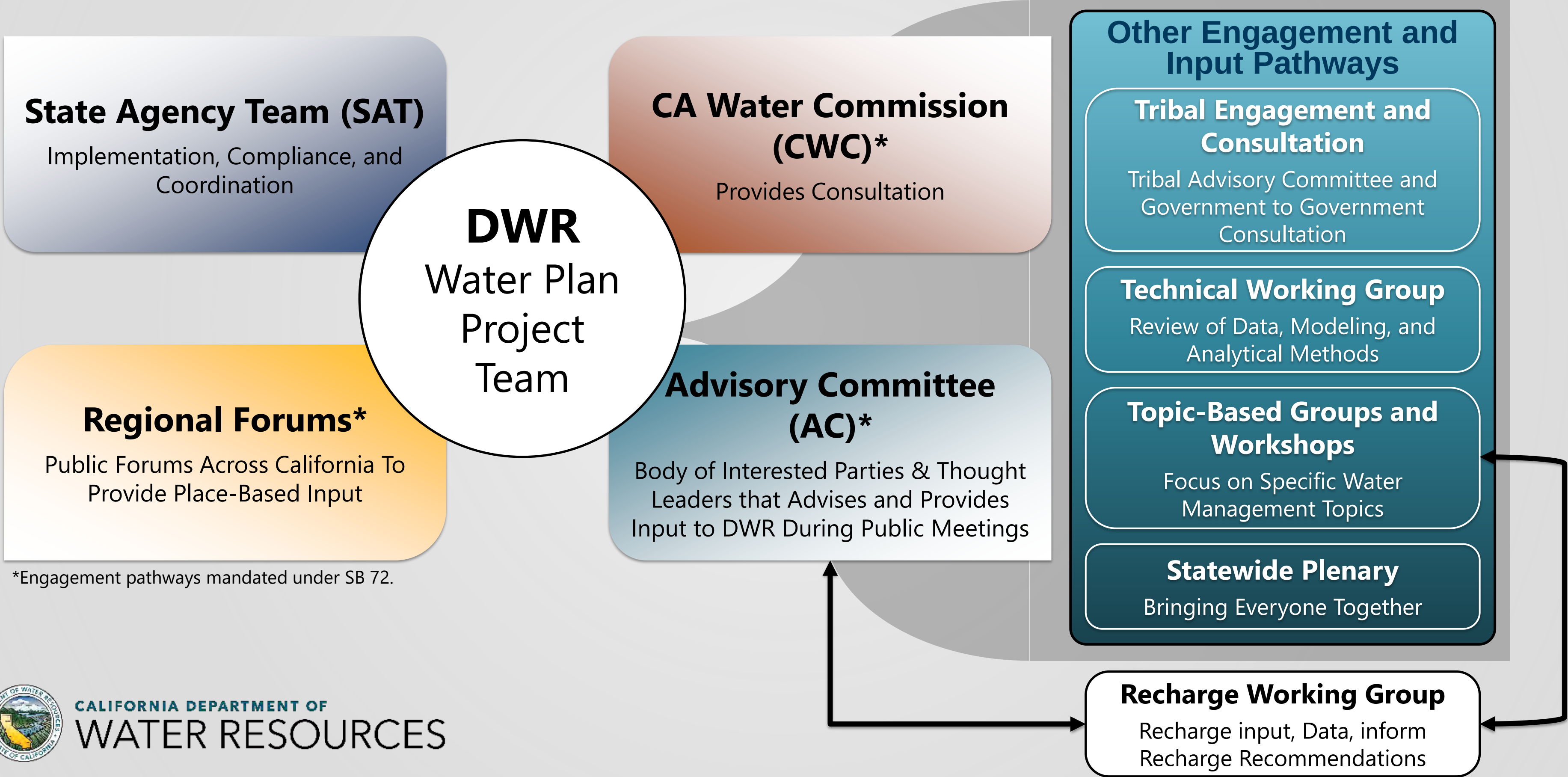

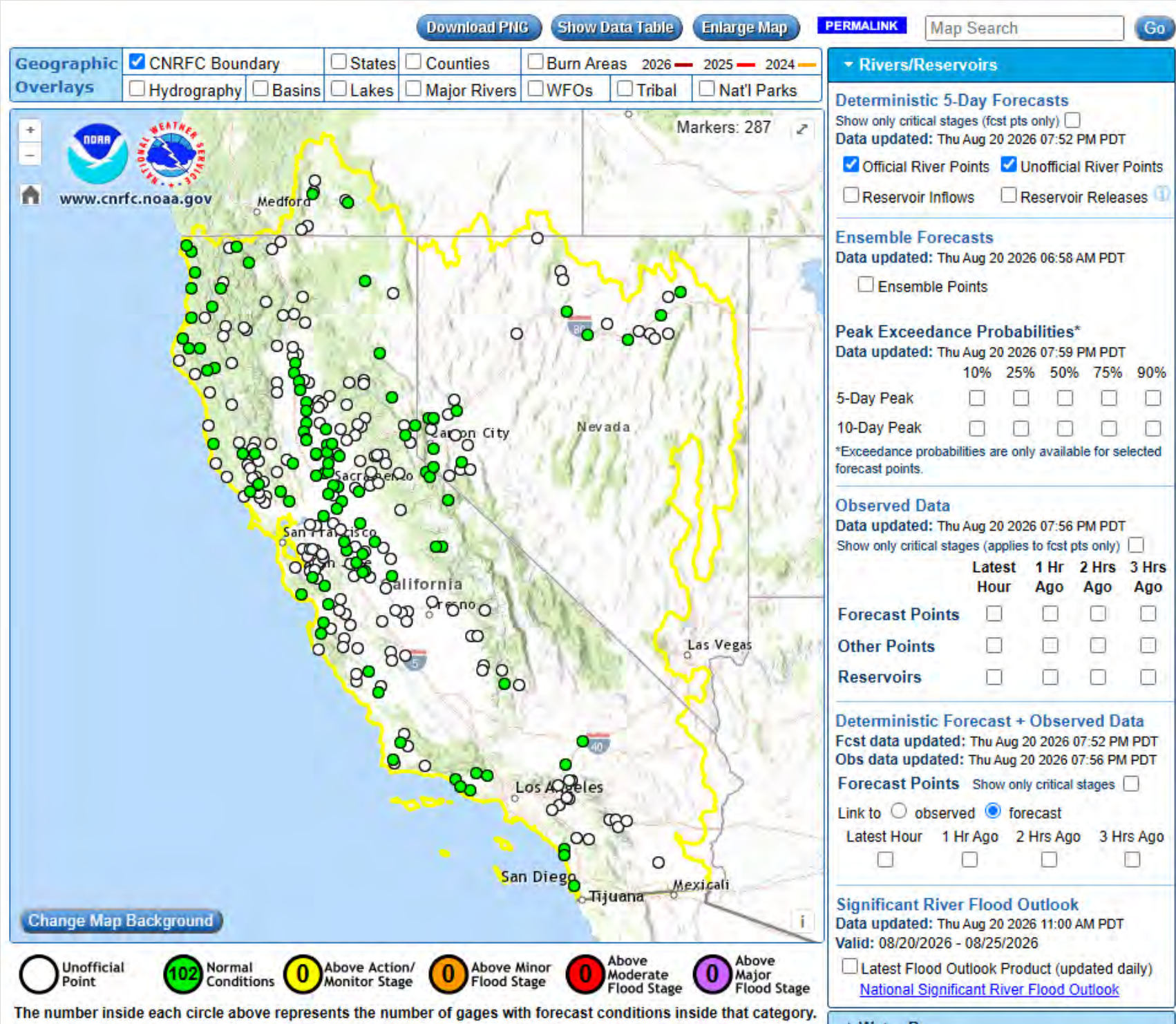


Image: Example of CNRFC River Forecast Points (Aug. 20, 2026)

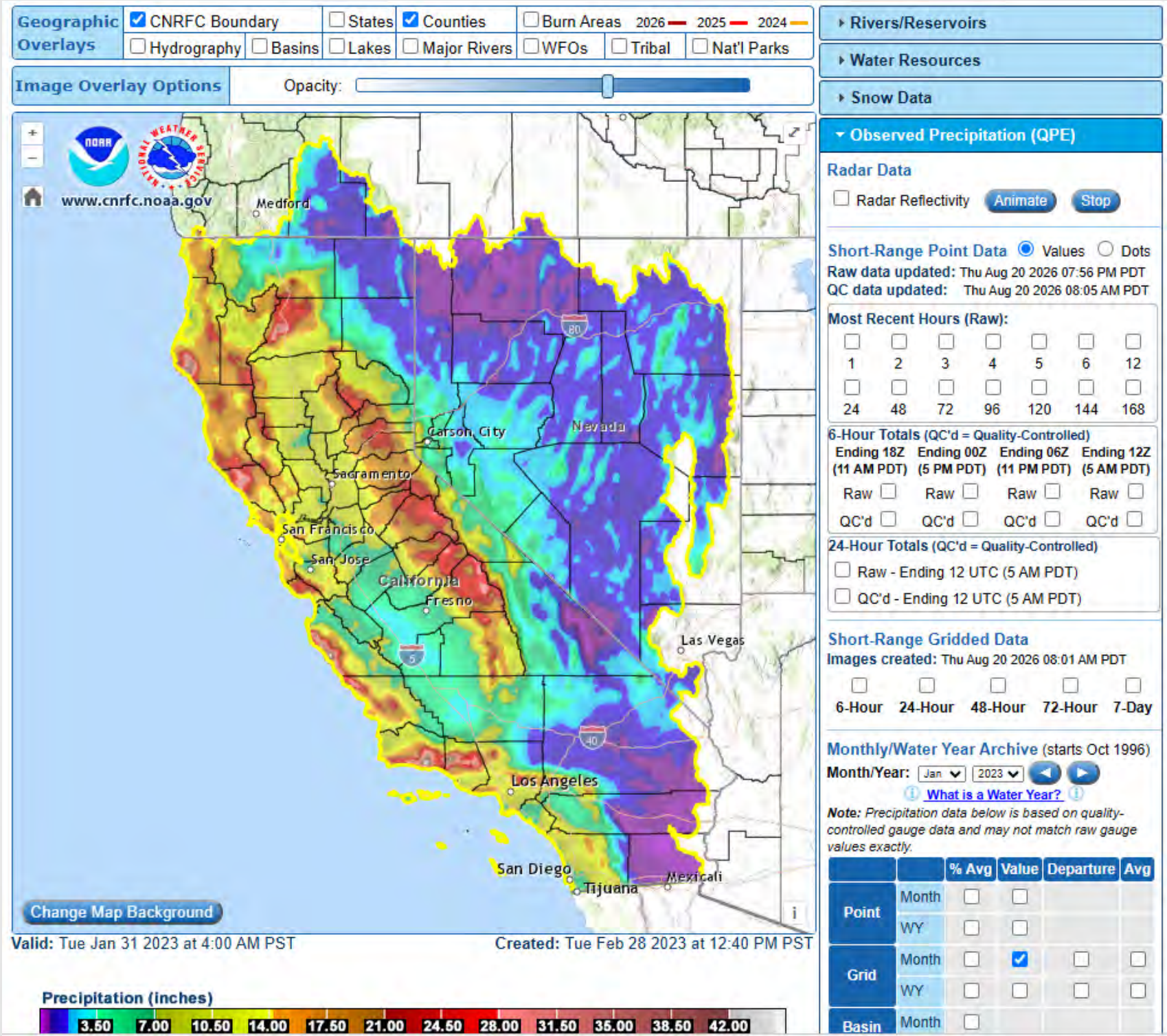


Image: Example of CNRFC Gridded Precipitation (Jan. 2023 Monthly Total Observation)

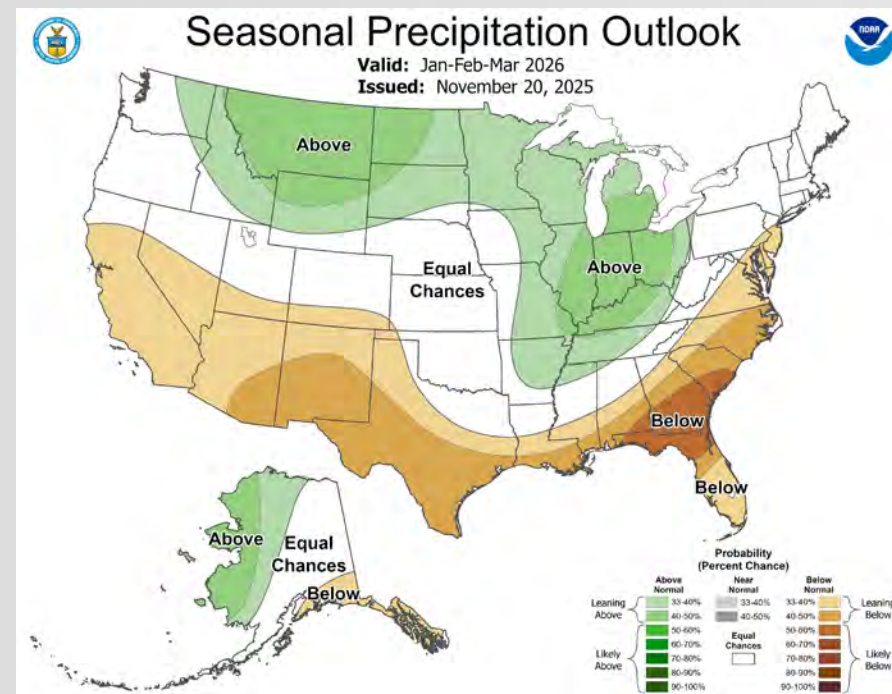


Image: NOAA Climate Prediction Center's 1.5 Month Seasonal Precipitation Outlook (Nov. 2025)

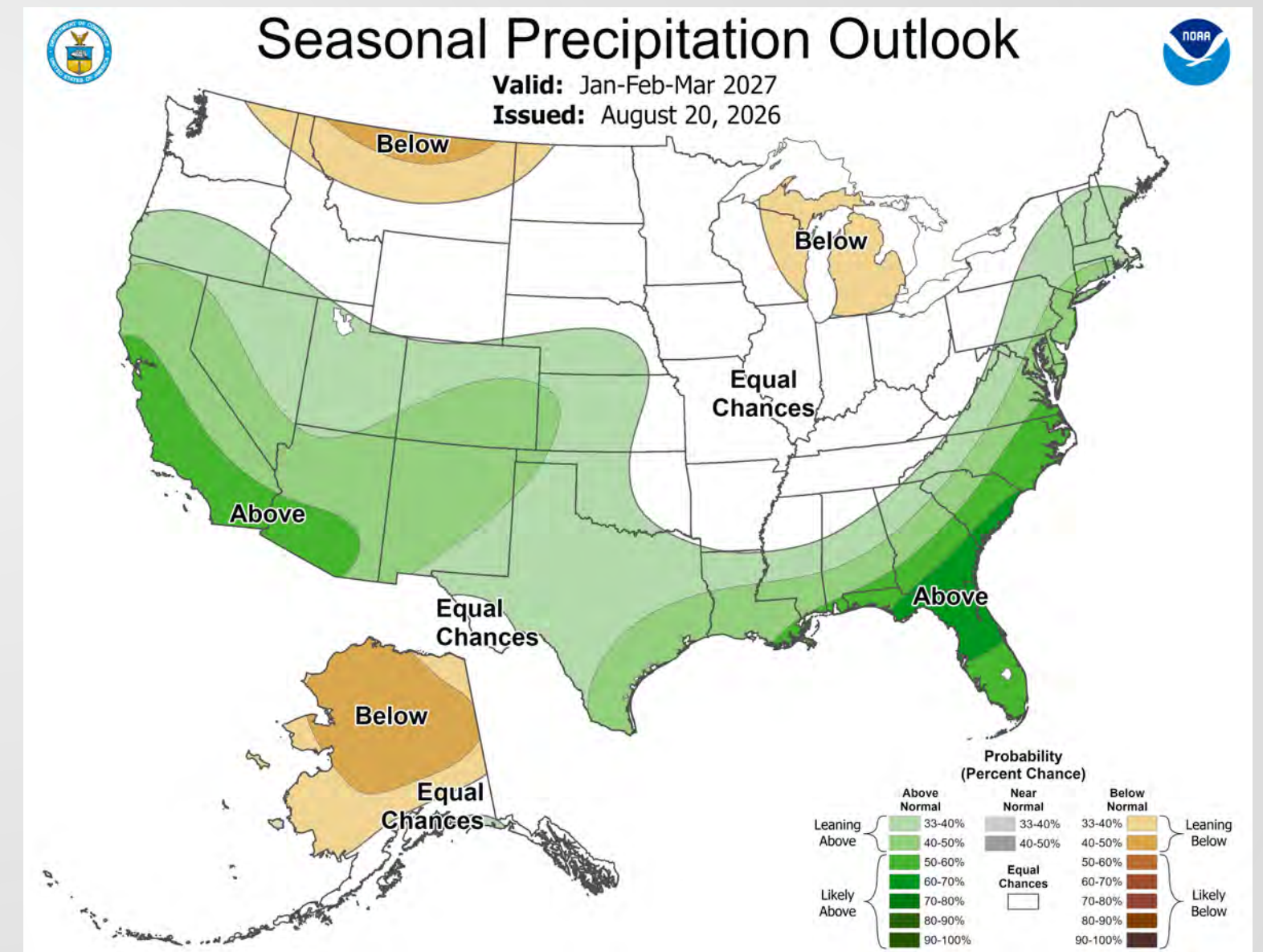


Image: NOAA Climate Prediction Center's 4.5 Month Seasonal Precipitation Outlook (Aug. 2026)

CEAC Flood Control and Water Resources Policy
Committee

August 21, 2026



Enacted into law

- AB 35 (Alvarez)
 - Adds APA exemption to Prop 4
 - Committee amendments present additional challenges
 - Potential budget trailer bill



Currently Active - Support

- AB 2032 (Ransom) Fish and wildlife: invasive mussels: golden mussels
- AB 2051 (Wicks) Public resources: Coastal Resilience Permitting Working Group
- SB 872 (McNerney) Delta Levees and Canal Subsidence Fund



Currently Active - Oppose

- AB 1881 (Ramos) California Indian Freedom Act of 2026
- AB 2218 (Kalra) Water policy: California Native American tribes



State Budget – Remaining Action

- Proposition 4 – Allocations yet to be finalized; stormwater funding, water supply infrastructure remain potential recipients
- Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund – Recent changes place strain on available water infrastructure funding



Looking Ahead – 2027-28 Legislative Session

- Potential CSAC sponsored legislation targeting permit streamlining at CDFW
 - Time lines and deadlines
 - Financial assurance
 - LSAA/CESA reforms
 - Mitigation requirements



Looking Ahead – Executive Order

- Action needed now from Governor to prepare for coming El Niño conditions
- EO N-10-23 previously waived CEQA/CDFW/SWRCB permits for flood management projects
- New executive order may be required, with expanded geographical reach and inclusion of additional permits
