Concurrent Sessions:

Using the Data in Your Pavement Management Systems to Improve Cost-Effectiveness

Learn how agencies can unlock greater value from data already collected through Pavement Management Systems (PMS) by looking beyond basic Pavement Condition Index (PCI) scores and focusing on additional indicators. By cracking the data that has already been collected and paid for, agencies can improve the selection and timing of maintenance and rehabilitation work. This talk will show what to focus on, and how to improve decision making regarding treatment selection and timing.

Upping Your Communications Game

How many times have you heard: “*I never got the notification,*” “*Who decided to remove parking for a bike lane?*” or “*Who do I talk to about the sprinklers that run nonstop?*” As demand for instant information rises, local agencies are under pressure to deliver timely, clear, and accessible messaging. In this session, public works directors and a communications team member will share effective engagement strategies. Learn what works - from quick posts to high-impact videos - and leave with actionable ideas and adaptable communication plan templates for your agency’s size and resources. Even if you “are” the communications team, this session will help you take your outreach to the next level.

A New Hope for Deferred Maintenance: Tackling an 18-year Backlog.

In a galaxy not so far away, the City of Rosemead faced an epic challenge: nearly two decades of deferred maintenance threatening civic well-being. Enter a new Public Works Director launching a bold mission to restore balance to the city's facilities within the first six months on the job! Along with Schneider Electric, Rosemead used California's Government Code 4217 energy performance contracting statute to bundle critical citywide improvements into one self-funded project. This initiative is modernizing outdated mechanical systems, replacing unsafe electrical infrastructure, upgrades lighting at City Hall, community centers, and advances a citywide street-lighting plan. This panel shows how collaboration, smart funding strategies, and technology can help cities overcome the dark side of deferred maintenance.

Fiber Frenzy: Navigating Fiber Deployments and Local ROW Management

As fiber deployments accelerate across California, local governments face increasingly complex questions about franchise rights, permitting, and the use of public assets. This session clarifies state and federal regulatory frameworks, including CPUC oversight, recent FCC actions, and new California laws on microtrenching and batch permitting, while outlining practical strategies for managing rights-of-way and negotiating access to government-owned fiber and conduit. Presenters will highlight best practices to avoid common permitting pitfalls, strengthen pavement and ROW management, and evaluate partnership opportunities with private providers. Attendees will leave with a clear understanding of the legal landscape and greater confidence in overseeing fiber projects.

Public Works Visibility: How to be Recognized as First Responders

Public works professionals have been referred to as the silent first responders. Typically, they are the first to arrive after natural or manmade disasters, clearing the way for other first responders, and last to leave, long after the emergency is over. Despite the Presidential Policy Directive 8 which officially recognizes public works as first responders, issued in response to 9/11, many do not regard public works as first responders. This presentation will share how to increase the visibility of your public works department with the public, elected officials and other departments within your agency.

Charging Ahead of ACF: Strategies to Accelerate the Shift to Zero-Emission Government Fleets

In 2025, the California Air and Resources Board (CARB) withdrew its waiver request to allow stricter enforcement of vehicle emission standards.. But, the Advanced Clean Fleets (ACF) rule doesn't require a waiver, leaving it up to state and local governments to lead the charge in California's EV transition. Is your agency prepared for the 100% ZEV procurement requirement coming in 2026? This panel brings together public works leaders – each representing different scales and stages of EV fleet implementation–to share lessons learned as they navigate the challenges of planning, funding, and deploying electric vehicles and charging infrastructure.

From Concept to Impact: AI Strategies for Public Works Leadership

Artificial Intelligence isn't an abstract concept, it's a tool transforming how public works departments operate and engage with their communities. Explore how AI is being used for predictive maintenance, smart dispatching, asset management, and synthesizing public input. Highlighting tools like Co-Pilot, ChatGPT, Claude, and more, along with California city-specific AI pilot programs and internal usage policies, this session will demonstrate how AI can enhance productivity, improve customer service, automate reporting and support decision-making, while maintaining ethical guardrails and transparency. Participants will leave with actionable insights, sample guidelines for safe experimentation, and a roadmap for integrating AI into everyday workflows. Whether you're looking to streamline processes, elevate community engagement, or just understand what the AI fuss is all about, this session will give you the confidence to take the next step.

Accelerating Sidewalk Repairs with Data and Slicing

This session highlights how the City of Sunnyvale paired field condition assessment with GIS to track and triage 4,700 sidewalk repair locations across the city. Through customized mobile data collection and asset management integration, Sunnyvale created an interactive platform for budgeting, planning, and progress tracking. The data enabled a hybrid approach, combining low-cost slicing repairs and full replacements, streamlining repairs, and improving public safety. Learn how public agencies can replicate this model to cut costs, prioritize repairs, and justify capital funding. The presentation includes workflow examples, data schemas, and lessons learned from implementation.

Claiming Compliance Credit for Stormwater Management Strategies

Stormwater runoff is heavily regulated throughout California, requiring municipalities of all sizes to implement comprehensive programs to control the discharge of pollutants in runoff. This panel presentation will explore an approach to tracking and quantifying benefits from structural stormwater controls, that provides a cost-effective way for municipalities to document regulatory compliance and communicate benefits to the environment and surrounding communities.

Strategic Funding and Grant Writing for Public Works

Obtaining grant funds should be a core mission of each public works department. Grant funds allow your agency to leverage limited local funds to deliver more impactful and high-quality public works projects. Join this session to learn important grant writing tips and tricks from two grant writing professionals who will each present a case study of recent successful grant applications. You will also hear insightful perspectives of a local agency project/grant manager. In addition to practical techniques, this session will emphasize the importance of strategic funding development through the intentional alignment of funding program efforts with community priorities and capital projects. Participants will explore how to develop a proactive funding strategy, identify competitive opportunities, build internal capacity for sustained success, and achieve community goals through successful grant writing and strategic planning.

From Staff to Systems: Retaining Knowledge within your Agency

This session equips maintenance superintendents with practical insights on how modern asset management can protect their workforce and infrastructure. Explore the challenges posed by an aging workforce, knowledge loss, and outdated legacy systems, while learning how documenting and formalizing maintenance practices can streamline daily operations, preserve institutional expertise, and strengthen capital planning. Through real-world examples and case studies, this session highlights how superintendents can lead change, improve efficiency, and build resilient teams ready for future demands. Additionally, learn how ArcGIS Online can be used to create custom solutions designed to track the repair and replacement of city assets, such as signs, potholes, ADA ramps, and more.
